

We are all born with innate abilities, but to varying degrees. Regardless of ability, everyone deserves the chance to grow to their highest potential. We strive to improve lives by maximizing brain and body function.

Our Mission is to promote the maximum development of the whole person through innovative, individualized, and comprehensive brain-centered programs and services.



WHO WE SERVE

A Chance To Grow serves a wide range of people facing a variety of challenges -- children with neurological issues such as ADHD/austism, youth injured by contact sports, people suffering from trauma, toddlers with adverse childhood experiences, grade school students struggling to learn. What do they all have in common? Their brain function has been compromised by illness, injury, trauma, or inadequate development. To varying degrees, the people we serve are struggling with communication, with academic work, with daily tasks, with emotional regulation. And their families struggle. Too often they have run the gamut of doctors, schools, therapists, and specialists, and still, they struggle. At A Chance To Grow they can find help.



PROGRAMS WE PROVIDE

We have developed a unique, comprehensive, and customizable array of clinical interventions aimed at helping those with impaired neurological function, regardless of its origin. We also have educational programs for children and we train teachers and child care providers on how to strengthen the neural pathways critical to a child's learning and development.

Our primary program areas are all rooted in the science of neurophysiological brain development. Our programs and services are offered in clinical, school, and home settings. We especially want our life-changing services available for those who need them most -- families with substantial barriers to getting the support they need, whether it be appropriate health care, education, high-quality child care, or other supports.





A MESSAGE FROM OUR DIRECTOR

Erica Dickerson has been with A Chance To Grow for the past 23 years, previously serving as Director of Clinical and Home-Based Services.



Dear Friends,

Innovation is in A Chance To Grow's DNA. If our founders had not searched for new ways to help brain-in-jured children, we would not be here. Seeking new approaches is integral to our strategic plan, because without doing so, we cannot meet our mission – To promote the maximum development of the whole child and adult through innovative, individualized and comprehensive brain-centered programs and services.

Two of our departments led the challenge to innovate this year:

Our Minnesota Learning Resource Center (MLRC) has been in the forefront of bringing brain-based educational interventions for years to teachers, through its Stimulating Maturity through Accelerated Readiness Training (S.M.A.R.T.), first in K-3 and Pre-K classrooms. Four years ago, we developed a version for use by Family Child Care Providers to ensure that the littlest learners, especially in rural areas, are ready to learn. In its fourth year, the S.M.A.R.T. Steps project is growing in leaps and bounds. The MLRC has made invaluable partnerships with four of Minnesota's Initiative Foundations, allowing the program to expand well into the Northern, Northwest, Central and Southern areas of the state. To date, S.M.A.R.T Steps is in 37 counties. We've trained more than 150 FCC's, ensuring that children in rural areas can get enhanced learning readiness. Says one provider, "It was the best thing I ever did, I feel I am really helping these kids!"

Our Turnquist Child Enrichment Center serves at-risk children ages 6 weeks to 5 whose development is threatened by numerous factors. To address the barriers to social-emotional growth, the Center has added the Conscious Discipline approach to its repertoire of trauma-informed curricula. This ground-breaking approach is designed specifically to provide children with the tools needed to feel safe, stay connected, and handle their feelings appropriately. Combined with our S.M.A.R.T. approach, and other resources recently adopted, Turnquist is on the cutting edge of early childhood care and education.

Two departments saw major changes in staff.

- Julie Neumann, the Director of Clinical Services, left us after 17 years. Michelle Koyama, the Assistant Director who has been here 11 years, has replaced her. During this change, the department implemented the Raintree System, a platform designed specifically for Occupational, Speech-Language therapists, and other practitioners, which will help us better manage and grow the department.
- Home-Based Services said goodbye to Edith Lockhart, who had been with ACTG for 18 years. Jordan Dockan, our new Director, joined ACTG in February 2023, coordinating a team of more than 150 PCAs serving 70 families.

This year, our wonderful community partners, the East Minneapolis Exchange Club, the Northeast Lions Club, and the Kiwanis Club, have provided tremendous support to ACTG as a whole, and Turnquist in particular. We could not be more grateful.

We are also thankful for the support this year received from the Otto Bremer Trust, the Fred C. and Katherine B. Andersen Foundation, the Casey Albert T. O'Neil Foundation, the Northland Foundation, First Children's Finance, The Sauer Family Foundation, The Schulze Family Foundation, the Mardag Foundation, and last, but certainly not least, Sheet Metal Connectors for all of their support of our programs.

Change can be challenging, as it was at times in 2023, but as I look back over all we accomplished, I'm proud of our staff, our clients, and our families for working together to make this a great year!

WHAT MAKES US UNIQUE

- Our approach is built on movement-based brain science. We focus on the development of robust neural pathways that carry information from the senses -- vision, hearing, balance -- to the brain.
- We are able to help individuals with a wide range of neurological issues. While many organizations may
 focus on a single issue or challenge, we have adapted our approach to meet the needs of people with
 complex, sometimes overlapping issues. And we are able to provide coordinated care in ways others
 don't.
- We take a developmental approach. This holds that old issues and current challenges people face often originate when someone is unable to develop normally through a specific stage -- for any reason. This idea allows us to identify problems and address them in ways others cannot, because we look at the brain-body connection and systems, and how they impact overall development.

SCHOOL SERVICES

A Chance To Grow's School Services include Contract School-Based Services as well as Third-Party Billing for Charter Schools throughout the state of Minnesota.



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Supporting Special Education Resources

The Special Education programs and services supported by Third-Party Billing funds often include Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapy, Speech and Language Therapy, Hearing Services, Nursing Services, Mental Health Services, Transportation, Assistive Technology Devices, and additional aides (PCA's) and accommodations. Ensuring access to these services in school is critical for students with diverse needs. It fosters an inclusive learning environment where each student can thrive academically, develop essential skills, and build confidence, ultimately laying the foundation for success in school and beyond.



Contract School-Based Services

We contract our skilled Speech-Language and Occupational therapists, as well as our Optometrist and Audiologist to schools across the Twin Cities metro area and beyond. Our Contract School-Based Services support sensory processing needs, fine motor development, language skills, and much more for students with IEPs. We provide student-centered, academic-focused, and evidence-based therapies on-site by fully licensed and experienced clinicians.

Turnquist Child Enrichment Center is an NAEYC-accredited,
Strong Beginnings site, and a 4-star Parent Aware Certified child
care center for children ages six weeks to five years old. We emphasize cognitive and social-emotional development to help each
child reach his or her full potential. Additionally, teen parents are
provided with transportation services to help foster a stable home
environment and serve as a stepping-stone on their
path to self-sufficiency.

Conscious Discipline Curriculum

Turnquist Child Enrichment Center focuses on social emotional learning with the help of the Conscious Discipline program. Conscious Discipline is a comprehensive and trauma-informed social-emotional learning curriculum for teachers and families. The program provides ongoing learning opportunities to ensure safe schools and homes. In using Conscious Discipline, we commit to developing warm and caring environments for the youngest of learners.

COMING IN 2024

To facilitate family engagement and community partnerships, Turnquist has partnered with Wanda Felder, an expert in Parent and Early Childhood Education at Minneapolis Public Schools, to host Parent Education Nights. Starting in 2024, Turnquist will be hosting Parent Education Nights Quartly with new and interesting topics for discussion.



EDUCATIONAL SERVICES

The Minnesota Learning Resource Center (MLRC) meets the mission of providing brain-centered training programs through workshops, and supporting educators in using a developmental approach with learners.

Steps training prepares Family Child Care Providers with the knowledge and tools they need to better support the cognitive, physical, and social-emotional development of children, aged 0-5.

HOME-BASED SERVICES

A Chance To Grow's Home-Based Services provide support to families who are caring for loved ones with a variety of physical, mental, behavioral and emotional needs.



Personal Care Assistants

ACTG's Home-Based Services provide families with Personal Care Assistant (PCA) services for children and adults with a variety of physical, mental, behavioral and emotional needs. Our program pairs a client with a PCA of their choosing and, with our staff of Registered Nurses, creates a custom care plan tailored to the client's situation.

Waiver Services

Home-Based Services offer two waiver programs, Respite Care and Homemaking, to homebound individuals. Respite Care gives families a break from taking care of child or adult family member with a disability. Homemaking helps individuals manage a variety of daily tasks to enhance their quality of life.

COMING IN 2024

ACTG anticipates significant changes within the Personal Care Assistance (PCA) program in Minnesota as the state transitions to Community First Services and Supports (CFSS). This transition will introduce new possibilities, such as allowing parents of minors to provide care services to their children and spouses to care for their partners within the program. While the exact launch date of these changes remains undisclosed, it is anticipated to launch in 2024 and we are actively preparing to adapt our services to meet the evolving needs of our community.



Pulaski Gets S.M.A.R.T.I.

Meet the Early Childhood Education Duo whose incredible efforts have resulted in district-wide implementation of A Chance To Grow's S.M.A.R.T. program!

Innovative and effective describe the brain-centered therapies A Chance To Grow began developing nearly 40 years ago. Our S.M.A.R.T. (Stimulating Maturity through Accelerated Readiness Training) program evolved when research started to document that, for many children, the first signs of neurodevelopmental issues surface as they start school. ACTG's Minnesota Learning Resource Center (MLRC) was formed to adapt our brain-stimulation programs for students who have trouble learning for any reason. Designed for easy integration into a school day, S.M.A.R.T. uses daily movement activities to strengthen neural pathways that are critical for learning.

What began as a K-3 program now has Pre-K and Family Child Care versions. Over the last 24 years, through 2023, A Chance To Grow has trained 8,010 teachers in the effective use of S.M.A.R.T. Pre-K and S.M.A.R.T. K-3, plus we have mentored teachers in 348 schools in Minnesota and a dozen other states.

For the last 14 years, Amber Molle has joined Sara Nys's classroom every morning to help students improve their speech and language skills. Sara, a Special Education Teacher who works with 3-5 year olds, and Amber, a Speech-Language Therapist, are a dynamic duo in early childhood education at Lannoye Elementary in Pulaski. Their S.M.A.R.T. journey started some 14 years ago, and their dedication to the program has positively affected hundreds of children in their classroom and beyond.

It all began when Amber attended a mini S.M.A.R.T. training in Milwaukee, WI, and returned to school, inspired to try the program. As it turned out, Sara's classroom was a great fit to share S.M.A.R.T. activities with students.



Says Sara, "Since the children that come to my class are just beginning their educational journey, they are often lacking the skills they need in order to learn in the classroom environment."

Eager to learn more, Sara and Amber invested in the 4-hour drive to Minneapolis, MN, in October 2014 to take the three-day S.M.A.R.T. training. The pair garnered many insights that hit home and reminded them of their students. One in particular stood out: "We had previously thought that once children reach specific stages of development, that they can only move forward. We didn't fully realize how elastic the brain is, and for how long the brain is elastic. The coolest part was learning that students could go back, even all the way to reflexes to integrate those skills."

Amber explains, "We get kids that when they turn three, are really significantly delayed in language. Knowing that those students can go back and focus upon the key readiness skills that they need to be in place before developing language, was a huge discovery."

As a speech therapist, Amber values how the S.M.A.R.T. program encompasses the whole child. Amber works with children aged 3-5 years with and without special needs. "So many of the challenges that my speech and language delayed students face can be helped through movement," says Amber. All of the concepts covered by the program, such as prepositions, thematic vocab, readiness vocab, and directional words, help her students get far greater practice repetitions than with traditional methods. S.M.A.R.T. also helps her kiddos be more ready to learn in all aspects of their day, including therapy.


Every Pulaski Elementary School has tactile trackers and cross-patterning opportunities on the walls, pads for balance practice, and other S.M.A.R.T. activities placed throughout the school.

As a result, the S.M.A.R.T. Team in Pulaski grows every school year. They train teachers, Occupational Therapists, Physical Therapists, Speech Language Therapists, School Psychologists, program support professionals, paraprofessionals, and new staff during teacher orientation week. Paraprofessionals receive additional training, learning specific concerns to look out for when students perform S.M.A.R.T. activities and what cues and modifications to make. The team at Lannoye apply what they have learned and implement the S.M.A.R.T. program where students need daily support the most, right inside the classroom.



S.M.A.R.T. activities lend themselves to fun themes that kids love!

Sara says the positive impact of S.M.A.R.T. has been astounding: "When our students get to first, second, third grade, their teachers can tell which students have gone through the program. Even early childhood kids as they go into Four-Year-Old Kindergarten, the teachers can always tell those that have had S.M.A.R.T. in early childhood, because their ready-to-learn skills are more intact than some of the students going straight to kindergarten."

But they don't stop there. They ensure that parents are highly involved in their children's S.M.A.R.T. learning. Sara and Amber send students home with educational information about the program and they host parent nights, where parents can try S.M.A.R.T. activities with their children.

Amber shares why the S.M.A.R.T. program is such an essential part of teaching for her: "I'm not just teaching language. The students that come to me, and all kids that come to us, have far greater needs than just one thing. S.M.A.R.T. hits on that holistic element. Social skills of learning, how to wait in line, let your friend go first, how to partner with a friend for an activity. It's not just motor, it's not just vision, it's not just auditory, it's not just repetitive concepts, it's holistic development."


